WHITLEY COUNTY COUNCIL

July 2, 2019

The Whitley County Council met in regular session at 8:00 am on Tuesday, July 2, 2019 in the Commissioner's Room located on the first floor of the Whitley County Government Center. Members in attendance were Chairman Thor Hodges, Vice Chairman Chad Banks, Kim Wheeler, Thomas Warner, Timothy Kumfer, John Barrett and William Overdeer. Others in attendance were Robert Bryan from the Bowen Center, EDC President Jon Myers, Brian More from Micropulse, Inc., Liane Rambo from Micropulse, Inc., Mista Lauber from the Bowen Center, Jay Baumgartner from the Bowen Center, Sheriff Gatton, Chief Deputy Sheriff Jason Spencer, Jail Commander Sean Martin, Scott Schmidt from the Sheriff's Department, Paula Reimers from Court Pretrial Services, Leslee Robinson from STAR Insurance, Paula Worden from Community Corrections, Tim Hartman from the Sheriff's Department, Judge Fahl, Theresa Green, Tim Summers from the Maintenance Department, Prosecutor DJ Sigler, Mary Hartman from the Peabody Public Library, Kennedy St. George from the EDC and Pone Vongphachanh.

Chairman Thor Hodges called the meeting to order and led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE LOCAL INCOME TAX ORDINANCE: Sheriff Gatton first spoke regarding the local income tax being considered for corrections. Sheriff Gatton gave reason to the Council of why the Jail tax is needed and stated that it is time to protect himself and his staff from lawsuits. Since 2008, State of Indiana Department of Correction annual Jail inspection through 2018 Jail inspections, Whitley County has been continually written up. This is not due to staff failure but due to building design, structure and inadequacies. Since 2008, the County has been informed for 11 years that we do not have any negative air flow cells for medical segregation. With the increased medical issues with the inmates, they recently has to put four medical supervised inmates into a big holding cell. This in return causing holding new inmates in the facility a problem. The medical staff and Jail personnel work hard to get these inmates treatment and work with the other divisions of the criminal justice system to find alternative sentences or placements. They have also been told for 11 years that the Jail does not have adequate staffing. In 2014, a staffing study was completed and it stated at that time the department needed an additional 13 staff members/confinement officers. The Council has graciously added a few staff members/officers for the Sheriff's Department but they are still 11 short. Sheriff Gatton continued to state all of the issues with the Jail. Sheriff Gatton would also like to have a body scanner as well but they do not have the space at the Jail. Todd Samuelson from Baker Tilly also gave some additional information on the income tax. If the Council passed the ordinance to adopt the local income tax, it would generate \$1,700,000 per year and all of the funds would go only to the County. The local income tax proposed tax rate for correctional and rehabilitation facilities is 0.2000%. This would tax our expenditure rate for local income taxes from 1.4500% to 1.6500%. With no further public comments or questions, Chairman Hodges closed the public hearing.

IN THE MATTER OF THE LOCAL INCOME TAX ORDINANCE ADOPTION: Councilman Kumfer made a motion to approve Ordinance 2019-06 adopting the correctional and rehabilitation facilities income tax at 0.2000%, seconded by Overdeer and passed with a 5/2 vote with Banks and Wheeler against.

IN THE MATTER OF THE ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION REQUEST: Prosecutor DJ Sigler presented an additional appropriation request to Council. DJ informed them that a full time employee is transitioning to a new career and he would like to hire her part time to train her replacement. He is requesting that the part time funds to pay her be appropriated in the Infraction Deferral fund and will not have an impact on County General. The amount requested will cover the remainder of 2019 and DJ stated he will return in January of 2020 if the part time work and training is still needed.

Council member Barrett made a motion to approve the additional appropriation request, seconded by Overdeer and carried with a 7/0 vote.

IN THE MATTER OF THE PRETRIAL SERVICES GRANT: Paula Reimers from Community Corrections, along with Judge Rentschler and Judge Fahl, were present to inform the Council that they received a Pretrial Services grant. Whitley County was paid \$94,168.00 for this grant and the courts are asking to utilize the funds. They are requesting the funds to be used for a full time salary of \$43,500 plus benefits. Councilman Overdeer made a motion to approve the request to utilize the grant funds, seconded by Kumfer and passed with a 7/0 vote.

IN THE MATTER OF THE ABATEMENT RESOLUTION AMENDMENT: EDC President Jon Myers presented a request from Micropulse for an abatement resolution amendment. The proposal included an investment of \$1,700,000 in real estate improvements, \$5,184,000 in new equipment and 25 new jobs to their current location on State Road 14. The project will add new machining and inspection capacity to its current facility for manufacturing medical implants and instrumentation. They are requesting the real estate abatement and personal property abatement for ten years. Councilman Wheeler made a motion to approve the Personal Property abatement per Resolution 2019-08 for ten years and the Real Estate abatement per Resolution 2019-09 for ten years, seconded by Banks and carried with a 7/0 vote.
